4	<b>graduate</b> to complete school, college or university correctly	Lorna graduated from the University of London.
5	<b>achieve</b> to succeed in finishing something or reaching an aim, especially after a lot of work or effort	You can't achieve anything overnight.



6	<b>accomplish</b> to finish something successfully or to achieve something	Did you accomplish your goal?
7	<b>fulfill</b> to do something that is expected, hoped for or promised or to cause it to happen	Beyonce can't fulfill her acting career.
8	<b>attain</b> to reach or succeed in getting something	He has attained the highest grade in his music class.
9	<b>perform</b> to do an action or piece of work	He performed his duty without difficulty.
10	<b>advance</b> to go or move something forward, or to develop or improve something	The fire advanced through the forest.



11	<b>found</b> to base a belief, claim, idea, etc. on something	The Soviet Union was originally founded on Socialism.
12	<b>establish</b> to start a company or organization that will continue for a long time	We have decided to establish a new department.
13	<b>organize</b> to do or arrange something according to a particular system	I've organized the training.
14	<b>compose</b> to be the parts that something is made of	Vivaldi composed many fine concertos.
15	<b>constitute</b> to form or make something	Spyware can constitute illegal trespass on home computers.
16	<b>allow</b> to make it possible for someone to do something, or to not prevent something from happening	Smoking is not allowed in the kitchen.





17	<p><b>permit</b></p> <p>to allow something</p>	The regulations do not permit much flexibility.
18	<p><b>accept</b></p> <p>to agree to take something</p>	Do you accept credit cards?
19	<p><b>admit</b></p> <p>to agree that something is true, especially unwillingly</p>	I admit that I was wrong.
20	<p><b>recognize</b></p> <p>to know someone or something because you have seen, heard or experienced them before</p>	I can recognize him by his walk.
21	<p><b>notice</b></p> <p>to see or become aware of something or someone</p>	I noticed that you read the New York Times every day.
22	<p><b>respect</b></p> <p>to feel or show admiration for someone or something that you believe has good ideas or qualities</p>	I respect my parents earnestly.
23	<p><b>praise</b></p>	





	to express admiration or approval about the achievements or characteristic of a person or thing	My parents always praised me when I did well at school.
24	<b>admire</b> to respect and approve of someone or their behavior, or to find someone or something attractive and pleasant to look at	We admire a brave person.
25	<b>worship</b> to have or show a strong feeling of respect and admiration for God or a god	People go to church to worship God.
26	<b>appreciate</b> to recognize or understand that something is valuable, important or as described	I deeply appreciate your kindness.



27	<b>impress</b> to cause someone to admire or respect you because of something that you have done or said	The speech impressed the audience.
28	<b>regard</b> to consider or have an opinion about something or someone	We all regard him as a friend.
29	<b>reward</b> to give someone a reward, which is something given in exchange for good behavior or good work, etc	Tom received a reward of one million yen for the invention.
30	<b>congratulate</b> to praise someone and say that you approve of or are pleased about a special or unusual achievement	Congratulations on your promotion.
31	<b>treat</b> to behave towards someone or deal with something in a particular way	Stop treating me like a child.

32	<p><b>greet</b></p> <p>to welcome someone with particular words or a particular action, or to react to something in the stated way</p>	<p>Justine greeted me with a smile.</p>
33	<p><b>bow</b></p> <p>to bend your head or body forward, especially as a way of showing someone respect or expressing thanks to people who have watched you perform</p>	<p>He bowed down before the king.</p>
34	<p><b>consider</b></p> <p>to spend time thinking about a possibility or making a decision</p>	<p>I'm considering going to Tokyo.</p>
35	<p><b>conceive</b></p> <p>to imagine something</p>	<p>I think my uncle still conceives of me as a four-year-old.</p>
36	<p><b>glance</b></p> <p>to give a quick short look</p>	<p>I glanced through the newspaper.</p>



37	<b>stare</b> to look for a long time with the eyes wide open, especially when surprised, frightened or thinking	Don't stare at people like that, it's rude.
38	<b>gaze</b> to look at something or someone for a long time, especially in surprise, admiration or because you are thinking about something else	People are gazing at the billboards.
39	<b>please</b> to make someone feel happy or satisfied, or to give someone pleasure	I was pleased at your success.
40	<b>prefer</b> to like, choose or want one thing rather than another	I prefer beer to wine.
41	<b>satisfy</b> to please someone by giving them what they want or need	I was satisfied to meet her last night.





42	<b>relate</b> to find or show the connection between two or more things	The evidence does not relate with the fact.
43	<b>refer</b> to talk or write about someone or something, especially briefly	Hawaii is often referred to as the Paradise of the Pacific.
44	<b>concern</b> to be important to someone or to involve someone directly	This concerns my mother.
45	<b>depend</b> to be decided by or to vary according to the stated thing	Children depend on their parents.
46	<b>rely</b> to need a particular thing or the help and support of someone or something	Nicole has to rely on money from her parents.



47	<b>lean</b> to slope in one direction, or to move the top part of the body in a particular direction	He leans against the wall.
48	<b>add</b> to put something with something else to increase the number or amount or to improve the whole	Add chicken and cook until browned.
49	<b>claim</b> to ask for something of value because you think it belongs to you or because you think you have a right to it	She claims it as her property.
50	<b>require</b> to need or make necessary	He requires hospital treatment.

52	<b>persist</b> to try to do or continue doing something in a determined but often unreasonable way	He persisted in denying his knowledge of it.
53	<b>demand</b> to ask for something forcefully, in a way that shows that a refusal is not expected	The policeman demanded my name and address.
54	<b>supply</b> to provide something that is wanted or needed, often in large quantities and over a long period of time	The supply cannot meet the demand.
55	<b>provide</b> to give someone something that they need	Cows provide us with milk.



56	<b>offer</b> to provide or supply something	Tours of Mozart's birthplace are offered every half hour.
57	<b>furnish</b> to provide with furniture; to put furniture in	This house is well furnished.
58	<b>grant</b> to give or allow someone something, usually in an official way	They granted her an entry visa.
59	<b>gain</b> to obtain something that is useful, that gives you an advantage, or that is in some way positive	This business gains a good profit.
60	<b>earn</b> to receive money as payment for work that you do	She earned money by washing cars.
61	<b>acquire</b> to obtain something	I was wearing a newly acquired jacket.



62	<b>obtain</b> to get something, especially by asking for it, buying it, working for it or producing it from something else	He obtained a teacher's license.
63	<b>imagine</b> to form or have a mental picture or idea of something	Can you imagine the sea with no fish?
64	<b>suppose</b> to think that something is likely to be true	I suppose you're right.
65	<b>assume</b> to accept something to be true without question or proof	He assumed that the express would be on time.
66	<b>suggest</b> to mention an idea, possible plan or action for other people to consider	Father suggested going on a picnic.



67	<b>assure</b> to tell someone confidently that something is true, especially so that they do not worry	I assure you that he is innocent.
68	<b>convince</b> to persuade someone or make them certain	It is difficult to convince him.
69	<b>persuade</b> to make someone do or believe something by giving them a good reason to do it or by talking to them and making them believe it	I couldn't persuade her after all my efforts.
70	<b>urge</b> to strongly advise or try to persuade someone to do a particular thing	He urged his horse.



71	<b>recommend</b> to suggest that someone or something would be good or suitable for a particular job or purpose, or to suggest that a particular action should be done	Can you recommend a good hotel in New York?
72	<b>promote</b> to encourage the popularity, sale, development or existence of something	What is being promoted in the advertisement?
73	<b>prove</b> to show that something is true	There is no theory to prove it.
74	<b>inform</b> to tell someone about particular facts	My daughter informed me that she was pregnant.
75	<b>indicate</b> to show, point or make clear in another way	Fever indicates illness.

76	<p><b>represent</b></p> <p>to show or describe something or someone</p>	<p>This photo represents him as a 22 year-old man.</p>
77	<p><b>reveal</b></p> <p>to make known or show something that is surprising or that was previously secret</p>	<p>He revealed his secret to the media.</p>
78	<p><b>propose</b></p> <p>to offer or state a possible plan or action for other people to consider</p>	<p>He proposed to his girlfriend.</p>
79	<p><b>argue</b></p> <p>to speak angrily to someone, telling them that you disagree with them</p>	<p>I argue with my brother all the time.</p>
80	<p><b>debate</b></p> <p>to discuss a subject in a formal way</p>	<p>That is still a matter of debate.</p>
81	<p><b>express</b></p> <p>to show a feeling, opinion or fact</p>	<p>Words can't express how happy I am.</p>

82	<p><b>describe</b></p> <p>to say or write what someone or something is like</p>	<p>The woman is describing her dream.</p>
83	<p><b>mention</b></p> <p>to speak about something briefly, giving little detail or using few words</p>	<p>You don't have to mention his name.</p>
84	<p><b>imply</b></p> <p>to communicate an idea or feeling without saying it directly</p>	<p>Are you implying that it was my fault?</p>
85	<p><b>remind</b></p> <p>to make someone aware of something they have forgotten or might have forgotten</p>	<p>The song reminds me of my happy school days.</p>
86	<p><b>recall</b></p> <p>to bring the memory of a past event into your mind, and often to give a description of what you remember</p>	<p>I can't recall his name.</p>

87	<p><b>remark</b></p> <p>to give a spoken statement of an opinion or thought</p>	<p>Everyone had remarked on her new hairstyle.</p>
88	<p><b>define</b></p> <p>to explain and state the meaning and exact limits of something</p>	<p>The power of the courts is defined by law.</p>
89	<p><b>agree</b></p> <p>to have the same opinion, or to accept a suggestion or idea</p>	<p>I agree with you on this issue.</p>
90	<p><b>approve</b></p> <p>to have a positive opinion of someone or something</p>	<p>I approve your choice</p>
91	<p><b>trust</b></p> <p>to have belief or confidence in the honesty, goodness, skill or safety of a person, organization or thing</p>	<p>You can trust him with money.</p>
92	<p><b>reply</b></p> <p>to answer</p>	<p>I called her name but there was no reply.</p>

93	<p><b>decide</b></p> <p>to choose something, especially after thinking carefully about several possibilities</p>	<p>Why did you decide to quit school?</p>
94	<p><b>determine</b></p> <p>to control or influence something directly, or to decide what will happen</p>	<p>Character is determined by early education.</p>
95	<p><b>resolve</b></p> <p>to make a decision formally or with determination</p>	<p>He resolved his MSN hotmail sign in problems.</p>
96	<p><b>conclude</b></p> <p>to judge or decide something after some consideration</p>	<p>The concert concluded with the national anthem.</p>
97	<p><b>settle</b></p> <p>to go and live somewhere, especially permanently</p>	<p>They settled in Canada.</p>
98	<p><b>utter</b></p> <p>to say something or to make a sound with your voice</p>	<p>She uttered her own secret.</p>



99	<b>whisper</b> to suggest privately that something might be true	People are whispering that she's going to retire next year.
100	<b>pronounce</b> to say a word or a letter in a particular way	How do you pronounce your surname?
