584	<p>indifferent</p> <p>not caring about or interested in someone or something</p>	<p>She is indifferent to dress.</p>

585	<p>conventional</p> <p>traditional and ordinary</p>	<p>He was a conventional man who was easily shocked.</p>
586	<p>superficial</p> <p>never thinking about things that are serious or important</p>	<p>You take a superficial view of the matter.</p>
587	<p>external</p> <p>of, on, for or coming from the outside</p>	<p>I don't care external affairs.</p>
588	<p>internal</p> <p>existing or happening inside a person, object, organization, place or country</p>	<p>The bank conducted its own internal investigation.</p>
589	<p>naked</p> <p>not covered by clothes</p>	<p>They stripped naked and ran into the sea.</p>
590	<p>bare</p> <p>without any clothes or not covered by anything</p>	<p>Don't walk around in your bare feet.</p>

591	<p>native</p> <p>relating to or describing someone's country or place or someone who was born in a particular country</p>	<p>Brenda is a native of southern California.</p>
592	<p>ugly</p> <p>extremely unattractive</p>	<p>I feel really fat and ugly today.</p>
593	<p>wild</p> <p>describes land that is not cultivated and has few people living in it</p>	<p>There are wild animals in the forest.</p>
594	<p>random</p> <p>happening, done or chosen by chance rather than according to a plan</p>	<p>We arranged the books on the shelves in random.</p>
595	<p>firm</p> <p>not soft but not completely hard</p>	<p>These pears are still too firm to eat.</p>

596	<p>severe</p> <p>causing very great pain, difficulty, anxiety, damage, etc.; very serious</p>	<p>The pain from a severe toothache is unbearable.</p>
597	<p>strict</p> <p>greatly limiting someone's freedom to behave as they wish, and likely to severely punish them if they disobey</p>	<p>My parents were very strict with me when I was young.</p>
598	<p>nuclear</p> <p>relating to weapons, or the use of weapons, which use the power produced when the nucleus of an atom is divided or joined to another nucleus</p>	<p>A nuclear war would be a disaster.</p>
599	<p>radical</p> <p>believing or expressing the belief that there should be great or extreme social or political change</p>	<p>We need a radical change in the tax system.</p>
